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NOTHING BUT THE TRUTH (SO HELP US GOD)

Thomas demanded to see Jesus resurrected from the dead—spike wounds and all—seeking the historical implications that would follow the event. He wasn't interested in a report *about* his resurrection, he was seeking a first-hand experience of this revolutionary act of re-creation—an experience of God's providence that was the fulfillment of God's promise to Israel.

True to its Old Testament roots, the New Testament regularly insists that the central framing question is that of God's purpose to save humanity from sin and death, and the re-creation and recapitulation of all things through Christ. Our destiny must be understood within that context—not simply in the sense that we're just part of a larger picture but that part of the point of being faithful and being saved in the present is so we can play a vital role within God's future: the coming together of heaven and earth; a process of liberation that began with the resurrection of Jesus Christ.

God saves us by working through the Holy Spirit to bring us to faith and by leading us to follow Jesus as disciples. As such, we're designed to be signs of what God wants to do for creation. Yet, we're not *just* to be signs of that ultimate salvation; we're to be part of the means by which God makes this happen in both the present and future: we're emissaries of God living the good news of Jesus Christ for the salvation of the world—we're Christ's beneficiaries as well as his agents.

Therefore, it's necessary for us to let Christ be our centre. "Doubting Thomas" is a terrible misnomer; what John describes is quite serious. The word "doubt" is never used in the original Greek text. Instead, the word is "unbelieving." Jesus literally says to Thomas, "do not be unbelieving, but believing." Just say "No" to disbelief—a tall order when we're looking for God's providence in a world that seems unaffected by Christ's rising from the dead almost all of the time.

Think of when friends and loved ones go through hopeless unemployment, when we minister to the poor, when we suffer illness or suffer with those who are ill. When we're victims of addiction, when we've lost a child, when we learn of the suffering of neighbours near and far, violent crime, conspiracy, wars and rumors of wars—and especially when we recognise evil in ourselves.......

isn't this enough to make us demand to see an Easter vision, to demand from God to live up to his Holy Name and to show himself resurrected and give us that infusion of grace so that we too can continue to follow Christ?

Jesus presents himself for Thomas' sight and invites him to touch, but he doesn't (at least John doesn't tell us that Thomas touches Jesus' wounds). Jesus speaking to him, showing him his wounds, offering him what he's asked for is enough. Thomas moves out of his unbelief to make the most profound confession of faith in the gospel: "My Lord and my God!" It's the ultimate confession of faith of who Jesus is—the Lord God. With Jesus' reappearance and invitation, Thomas brings history and faith together in a flash.

The Lord in question is the one who is the fulfillment of Israel's history as we all as the beginning of a new story in that historical context. Grasping the resurrection enables Thomas to see that Israel's history is full of partial and preparatory analogies for this moment. The epistemological weight is borne not simply by the promise of ultimate resurrection and new creation, but also by the narrative of God's mighty and faithful actions in the past.

And what about us? Why do we believe? We have the testimony of eyewitnesses. There would be no Church or Christian faith if there had been no eyewitnesses to the resurrection in the first place. We believe, in large part, because of their witness. And that was John's purpose for writing this Gospel, as he sums it up in the last two verses of this chapter. "Now Jesus did many other signs that his disciples witnessed, which I have not written here. But these are written so that you may come to believe that Jesus is the Messiah, the Son of God, and that through believing you may have life in his name."

The disciples received the Holy Spirit and that empowered them to leave the locked room and begin sharing the good news of the resurrection. Jesus sent them as witnesses throughout the world. Recall Peter standing up in the midst of the crowd in Jerusalem and preaching to those who had gathered from all over the world, saying "Jesus, who was crucified, was indeed the Messiah, the Son of God, and God raised this very Jesus, and all of us are witnesses." Moreover, we believe because Jesus has breathed the Holy Spirit on us, just as he breathed the Spirit on them. God the Holy Spirit moves within us and among us and brings us to belief.

Remember, at his ascension to the right hand of the Father, Jesus said he would send us the Comforter—the Holy Spirit—to strengthen us and sustain us until the end of the age... and the end of the age has begun.

How will God's new creation come, and then, how will we contribute to that renewal of creation and to the fresh projects that God will launch in it? We Christians don't merely know about something; and we don't hold back in claiming what is known. We don't merely know about Christ as a kindly moral teacher from ages past—through baptism and the Holy Spirit, we experience him. We know the Truth—in fact, nothing BUT the Truth, because we meet the Truth and recognise the Truth as Jesus Christ. And like Thomas, we confess him as Lord and God. This is to say that there is a categorical difference between knowing the Truth firsthand to be Jesus Christ and learning *about* the truth from a secondary source.

Secondary sources are vicarious teachers of truth who at best are relegated to their respective historical contexts (try praying to them). Jesus Christ is Nothing but the Truth Itself, who presents himself and his teaching to us at first hand—we receive the truth from God firsthand.

Receiving the truth at first hand has revolutionary consequences. In doing so, we're established as contemporaries of Christ—in the same generation as Thomas and all of the other disciples about whom we read in Holy Scripture.

The radical new world where Jesus reigns as Lord, has its frontline outposts in you and me—disciples who in baptism have shared his death and resurrection. We're the light of Christ for those who don't yet believe. The intermediate stage between the resurrection of Jesus and the renewal of the whole world is the renewal of human beings in our own lives of obedience right now. Resurrection doesn't mean escaping *from* the world, it means mission *to* the world based on Jesus' lordship *over the world*.

The good we do now through faith in Christ will last into God's future. These actions are part of building for God's kingdom—the foundations of salvation.

DAILYHOPE IS ON THE LINE - AGAIN!



A free telephone line that provides spiritual support for older people has been relaunched.

The DailyHope telephone line serves many people in later life unable to participate in person with church life in the community, either in the long term, or temporarily due to sickness or medical treatment. It was launched during the Covid pandemic.

The recorded phoneline provides a vital spiritual resource aimed at the around six million UK people aged over 65 who are either unable to use the internet safely and successfully or are not online at all.

The organisation "Faith in Later Life" announced earlier this year that the line would have to be suspended because of a lack of funding. It came as many churches were being encouraged to 'grow younger' and put an emphasis on reaching younger people. Now their chief executive officer Alexandra Drew has announced that the phoneline is back in action.

She said: "Closing the DailyHope line was an extremely heart-wrenching decision to make. I know that it's been a lifeline to many older people, especially those unable to attend church in person, and without access to spiritual comfort."

Now additional funding has been secured, DailyHope has been relaunched, with a drive to find new content and content-providers. Alexandra Drew said: "We're looking forward to welcoming new callers, as well as content providers and funding partners, to help us to continue to bring DailyHope to older people, and others who are staying at home."

Broadcaster Pam Rhodes, an ambassador for Faith in Later Life, said: "DailyHope has brought Christian fellowship through the landline into the homes of so many, filling their hearts and souls with God's presence and comfort through word, prayer and song. "It's no wonder that DailyHope has remained so popular – and the thought that this vital service may have been lost to those who value and rely upon it brought real despair. But now, we're thankful to God that DailyHope has been saved. This is wonderful news."

The DailyHope free telephone service is available on **0800 804 8044**. Churches and Christians are being encouraged to publicise the telephone number widely.

CHURCH HEATING



At the recent APCM, there was a discussion about the church heating system, which may have left some people with the impression that our system was no good and that we couldn't afford to replace it with a better one. Let me assure you that this is not the case – there is nothing significantly wrong with our system and we do not know of any alternative design that would work better at heating our large space.

To begin with some 'inconvenient truths':- Firstly, heating large, tall buildings like our church could be described as 'a mug's game'. The best that you can hope for is that some of the heat you pay for passes the congregation on its way to the ceiling for, be in no doubt, the ceiling is where it will certainly end up (because hot air rises). And our ceiling is a long way above where people sit! The best solution is for the heat to emerge under where people are sitting, i.e. from the floor. This is why a considerable number of cathedrals and large churches have gone to vast expense in recent years digging up their floors and installing underfloor heating. Thanks to foresight on the part of those designing our major refurbishment in 2007/8, we are fortunate enough already to have underfloor heating which, as well as being completely inconspicuous, gives a gentle, even heat across the whole area, instead of hot spots near radiators.

Secondly, you may not be aware that, one year ago, we were shocked by the news that our energy bill for the 4 months from December 22 to March 23 inclusive was £18,778. Yes, really! That's well over £1000 per week. I hope that none of you consider that level of expenditure on heating to be a proper use of our charitable funding: I certainly don't.

It is also unaffordable against our current level of income. So, something had to be done to reduce our expenditure and, during the recent heating season, we have carried out some experiments, one of which was mentioned in the APCM report. Early signs are that a significant reduction in energy expenditure has been achieved, but great vigilance is still needed.

We also have some radiators, mostly in the two chancels and memorial corner, where the underfloor heating does not extend, but the radiators along the sides of the new church nave are so small, and so far from where most people sit, that they have little effect on comfort.

They were probably put there solely to counteract the cold draughts descending from our very large single-glazed windows. Those windows make for a wonderfully light and airy worship space, but they are also a major source of heat loss, which will need dealing with if we are to reach 'net zero' in the future.

After the refurbishment we were advised to use the underfloor heating to maintain a constant temperature 24/7 and to use the radiators to supplement it only when needed. That advice was given when energy was cheap and there was much less concern about climate change. Circumstances are very different now and I think that we need to be more flexible. The main block of seating in the new nave is only regularly occupied for less than two hours each Sunday morning, and yet we heat it for the other 166 hours each week as well. If we can save money by heating the church less at times when it is never used, such as the night hours, we might be able to afford to heat it more when it is really needed.

In the future, we will probably be forced to replace our gas boilers with air source heat pumps, in line with General Synod's 'brave' decision to aim for 'net zero' by 2030. As it happens, underfloor heating is well matched to heat pumps, which cannot produce the higher water temperatures normal for radiator systems, whereas the plastic pipes used underfloor cannot handle those higher water temperatures.

NEWS FROM THE ARCHIVES



A Street View!

Sometimes working with the archives involves lots (and I mean lots!) of dusty letters that more or less say the same thing. As we know, these days we tend to email and receive response after response. Before emails we wrote letters!

Recently, I have been looking at an envelope marked 'road charges' with the letters all being dated in the 1960s. On the first read-through the words 'church hall', conjured up pictures of the church hall at Bark Hart Road, rather than the 'old church hall' on Church Hill. The letters however, persistently mentioned Aynscombe Angle!

Today's Orpington features a lot of concrete and building works go on all around us. Pieces of the 'old Orpington' as it used to be can still be seen but there is a lot of concrete and tarmac that we take for granted in this modern world as it makes our journeys that much smoother – apart from the pot holes that have a habit of appearing!

In May 1963, our Solicitors were in discussion with the Orpington Urban Council about possible road charges. One particular letter stood out. The church hall's longest side borders Aynscombe Angle, which until 1963 was an unmade road!

The charge that applied to All Saints' Church was estimated at £320 1s 0d, which I believe, according to the Bank of England's website, works out at roughly £5,596.04 in today's society!



The house pictured was originally called Angle End House and belonged to the Harris family for many years. Aynscomb was an old family name. The house stood on the corner of the road where it met the High Street. It was altered in the early 1930s and converted into shops. (*Ideal Homes: A history of S E London Suburbs*)

The small cottages that still stand today in Aynscombe Angle are in the 'Arts & Crafts' style and were designed by the architect George St Pierre Harris.


- Their complete recovery from both physical and emotional wounds

Rogation Sunday

The first Sunday in May is Rogation Sunday. This is when many parishes still 'beat the bounds'. Rogation means an asking of God - for blessing on the seed and land. The practice began with the Romans, who processed around the cornfields each Spring, singing and dancing, sacrificing animals, in order to get rid of evil. About 465 AD the Western world was suffering from earthquake and storm. Mamertius, Bishop of Vienne, aware of the pagan custom, ordered that prayers should be said in the ruined or neglected fields. Thus 'beating the bounds' became a Christian ceremonial. It arrived in England early in the eighth century. Each Spring, led by the priest, a little party from the parish would set out with a Cross to trace the boundaries of the parish. They'd implore God to keep their crops and roots and boughs in good health, and bring them to harvest. In the days when maps were scarce, 'beating the bounds' helped remind everyone just where the boundaries were. Do you know yours today?
